Do Your Teens Have Their Meningitis Shots?

Southwest Nebraska Public Health Department encourages all preteens and teens to get their meningitis (meningococcal) vaccination. Meningitis is a life-threatening illness that is caused by bacteria that infect the blood, brain or spinal cord. It is easily spread in crowded settings. You can catch meningitis from a person who looks healthy. Meningococcal vaccine protects against several strains of this disease.

"If your preteen or teen hasn't gotten a meningitis shot previously, ask their doctor or nurse about getting the shot now, states Melissa Propp, RN, Public Health Nurse. "Meningococcal disease is rare but does occur in the United States, most frequently in college settings."

Many colleges require a record of meningitis shots having been given prior to the start of classes. If you are traveling internationally to certain areas of the world, such as countries in Africa in the region known as the Meningitis Belt, you may also need this vaccine.

According to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) all 11 to 12-year-olds should be vaccinated with a meningitis ACWY vaccine. A booster dose is recommended at age 16 years. Teens and young adults (16 through 23) also may be vaccinated with a meningitis B vaccine (meningococcal serogroup B). In certain situations, other children and adults may be recommended to get meningococcal vaccines.
